ABSTRACT

Even close to four decades after the establishment of the first women's studies centre, the subject is not an essential qualification at the entry level in most such centres, in Indian universities. When there are doctoral and post-graduation programmes being offered, a few centres even offering undergraduate courses, and the National Eligibility Test now being conducted in women's studies, the question of eligibility criteria gains greater significance. Notably, the NET qualification in the concerned subject is a basic eligibility requirement to apply for an assistant professor position in the same subject at any university, as per the University Grants Commission rules.

An Inclusive Transformation of the Rural Non-farm
 Economy: Leveraging Farm-Non-farm Linkages, By

ABSTRACT

The informal rural non-farm economy of India is a crucial sector that impacts rural development. It is observed that a unilateral expansion of agriculture augments only the traditional non-farm sector in the rural informal segment. On the other hand, there is a biased expansion of its modern counterpart if the capitalistic formal economy develops disproportionately. Contrarily, simultaneous expansions of the agriculture and formal sectors induce both traditional and modern non-farm activities. A vital policy prescription is that for sustainable/inclusive development of the rural economy, a balanced expansion of the formal sector along with an expansion of both traditional and modern agriculture is

essential.

ABSTRACT

This article questions the methodology adopted in NITI Aayog's discussion paper on the progress of multidimensional poverty in India between 2005–06 and 2022–23. It highlights some of the limitations of the concept of multidimensional poverty and cautions against measuring the multidimensional poverty index through interpolation and extrapolation of past trends. It shows that the rate of poverty decline has actually declined after 2014–15. It is argued that instead of jumping to hasty conclusions based on a questionable statistical exercise, we should wait for the actual data on different indicators of MPI whenever these become available.

 Epicentre of Multidimensional Poverty: A Regional Analysis of Uttar Pradesh, By - Akarsh Arora

ABSTRACT

Multidimensional poverty in Uttar Pradesh is examined by employing a harmonised multidimensional poverty index methodology based on National Family Health Surveys. The results show that poverty declined, though rural concentration persisted. Undernutrition is a critical indicator of deprivation, while the standard of living dimension contributed most to poverty across all regions. Higher deprivation is recorded in larger households, younger and female-headed households, Muslim and Scheduled Caste communities, and nuclear families. Districts with lower services-to-manufacturing gross district domestic product ratio and with fewer small-scale industries face higher deprivation.

 Both visible and invisible: women, risk-taking and the expansion of fisheries technologies in South India, By – Nitya Rao & Natalie Djohari

ABSTRACT

Technological innovations in fisheries have generally been seen to exclude women, exacerbating both their economic marginalization and lack of political voice. Such a view however ignores the complexities underpinning the interface between technologies and social relationships, in particular, those of gender. In this article, we explore the impact of ring seine expansion in Cuddalore, a costal district of Tamil Nadu on the east coast of southern India, through the experiences of women fish auctioneers. We argue that women's contributions to the fisheries sector as auctioneers serves to both sustain and finance the expansion of the ring seine technology and does not just play a supportive, buffering role for household survival. The profitability of auctioneer work has transformed these women into the primary household providers, responsible for securing the intergenerational wellbeing of their extended families. Yet, women are not a homogenous group, hence exploring why some women are able to access these opportunities

successfully, negotiating both their entry into the market and financing of their roles, while others are excluded, illuminates how women navigate gendered constraints in relation to technological changes in the sector. We conclude by reflecting on the impact of the recent ring seine ban on the perceived wellbeing and growing indebtedness of these women.

 Women and land rights in Lao PDR. Treasure your matri heritage before it is too late! Where do we land up on gender equality?, By - Loes Schenk-Sandbergen

ABSTRACT

In Laos, the "Turning Land into Capital" policy has accelerated the implementation of new land management and land legislation, and a huge land titling project is forthcoming with plans to standardize "joint ownership" for marital land. In this paper, based on a set of interviews, Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) activities and 21 FGDs with women (and men) in 7 villages, the gender impact of the rural transition process and related new land policies on women living in a matrilineal-matrilocal village in the lowland, and a patrilineal-patrilocal village in the upland and forest, will be sketched, with a focus on land tenure and gender (in)equality. In policy-making and public debate on land titling the question of how the "joint" ownership for married women standardization can be achieved without sacrificing Lao women's individual matrilineal land rights is so far not an issue. Neither are the possibilities to claim matrilineal rights, or other out-of-the-box options to empower ethnic minority women for land rights issues.

 Networked feminism in a digital age—mobilizing vulnerability and reconfiguring feminist politics in digital activism, By - Sheena J. Vachhani

ABSTRACT

In what ways can we understand the productive tensions and complexities of digital feminist activism? This paper explores the increase of networked feminism, which focuses attention on digital activism and its relation to transformative social change. It suggests

that we need a better understanding of how digital feminist activism might be changing the shape of transnational feminist resistance and praxis, and how feminist politics are created and enacted in digitally mediated environments. These result in new forms of feminist consciousness built on affective and embodied engagements. The paper explores the complex and ambivalent role of affective politics and embodied ethics to explore conditions of vulnerability. Using illustrative, global cases to show the nuances across digital activism, the paper contributes to understanding the complexities and differential effects of online environments, the mediation of feminist politics through digital knowledge cultures and the possibilities, challenges, and productive tensions that lie in the ever-increasing use of digital environments.

 Women construction workers in Nepal: Collectivities under precarious conditions, By - Kalpana Wilson and Et.al.,

ABSTRACT

In this article, we explore the experiences of women construction workers in Nepal and the strategies that these workers have adopted to challenge the exploitation and inequalities they confront. We firstly argue that the experiences of women construction workers in Nepal are shaped by compulsive engagement in labor markets under conditions of informality, precarity, and gendered responsibility for social reproduction. These experiences reflect multiple intersections of gender, class, caste, and ethnicity in the arenas of the household, the workplace, trade unions, and the state. However, policy interventions related to women's participation in labor markets and inspired by the Gender Equality as Smart Economics approach, such as Nepal's post-earthquake mason training scheme targeting women construction workers, render invisible these structures of inequality, exploitation, and violence. Second, we argue that women construction workers negotiate—and in some cases challenge and change—working conditions, primarily through a variety of informal and formal collective strategies.

 Platform work-lives in the gig economy: Recentering work– family research, By – Al James

ABSTRACT

Crowdwork platforms have been widely celebrated as challenging gendered labor market inequalities through new digitally mediated possibilities for reconciling work, home, and family. This paper interrogates those claims and explores the wider implications of digital labor platforms for an expansive work-family research agenda stubbornly rooted in formal modes of employment in the "analogue" economy. Based on ethnographic research with women platform workers in the UK (using PeoplePerHour, Upwork, Freelancer, Fiverr, and Copify), the paper asks: what are women crowdworkers' lived experiences of integrating paid work and family relative to formal employment? And what coping tactics have women developed to reduce gendered work-family conflicts on digital labor platforms? In response to these research questions, the paper makes three contributions. First, it offers a critical review of recent commentary to theorize how disruptive innovations by digital labor platforms to recast long-standing definitions of "work", "workers", "managers", and "employers" have served to position platforms and platform workers as somehow outside the analytical gaze of the expansive work-family research agenda. Second, it extends a growing alternative work-family analysis of platform work to examine the kinds of "worklife balance" (WLB) provision available to women crowdworkers in the absence of an employer; and how women's experiences of algorithmically mediated and contradictory work-family outcomes further challenge widespread claims of new platform work-life "flexibilities". Third, the paper points to exciting and urgent possibilities for advancing and recentering work-family research through new engagements with platforms, algorithmic management, and "independent" platform workers in support of feminist activism and campaigning around WLB.

ABSTRACT

India is facing a period of seismic backlash against feminist and progressive politics and the pace of change, particularly over the last ten years, has been breakneck with serious consequences for women's equality and human rights. Drawing on an examination of the reversals and pushbacks against women's rights in three areas – the citizenship rights of Muslim women, the rights of domestic workers, and the impacts of restrictions on foreign

funding on women's rights organising – this article seeks to contribute not just to an understanding of the nature of the backlash faced by women's rights in India, but also to the wider debates on backlash from global South feminist perspectives.

<u>'It's a Family Matter': Inaction and Denial of Domestic</u>
 <u>Violence, By - Maheen Sultan & Pragyna Mahpara</u>

ABSTRACT

This article provides a grounded example of backlash in action surrounding the implementation of the Domestic Violence (Prevention and Protection) Act 2010 in Bangladesh. While formulation and enactment of the law marked significant achievements, its implementation has been weak. Unlike conventional analyses that concentrate on backlash in gender equality policy formulation, this study focuses on the obstacles encountered during the implementation phase. Through in-depth interviews with advocates and stakeholders responsible for implementation, the article examines their attitudes and interests concerning the law and women's rights to life, dignity, and bodily integrity. Prevailing gender norms perpetuate the trivialisation of domestic violence, framing it as a personal issue of minimal importance. Consequently, service providers tend to delegitimise and deprioritise it. This article investigates the strategies and tactics of deliberate inaction employed by backlash proponents, which is different from lack of capacity, and explores the counter-strategies deployed by advocates aiming to ensure the Act's effective implementation.
