The Charity's objectives for this tender process are to secure a provider that has the range of skills and experience to deliver a comprehensive evaluation of our UK Aid Match funded projects in the specified countries. Your proposal should cover all aspects of the services as described in the Terms of Reference.

4. Evaluation of proposals

Submitted proposals will be evaluated by a cross-functional panel.

Following the evaluation, the 2 or 3 highest scoring bidders will be shortlisted and asked to present their proposal in an interview with key stakeholders. We will question elements of the service proposal in order to further substantiate the bid and meet the proposed person/team.

5. Selection

Christian Aid intends to select a single provider for the services.

The selected provider will be contacted during week commencing 22nd June at which the parties will begin finalising the contract and agree an implementation plan.

Part 2: Background & Terms of Reference

1. Background

Christian Aid (CA) received UK Aid Match (UKAM) strategic funding of £5m in 2012 as part of a pilot DFID project that ran from 2012 – 2015. The funding from DFID has supported eight Christian Aid country programmes (CP) in Asia and Africa to work with partners to improve access to essential health services and sustainable livelihoods for over 700,000 beneficiaries. The UKAM programme ended in March 2015. This document outlines the terms of reference for an evaluation to focus on improving learning on the livelihoods results and theory of change implemented by Christian Aid as part of this programme¹.

At Christian Aid, we are committed to reviewing our work on a regular basis, using lessons learned to improve and inform thinking within our programmes and across the wider humanitarian and development sectors.

The timeframe for this evaluation coincides with a separate major piece of research (funded by DFID PPA) on Christian Aid's partnership approaches. This research seeks to develop a Theory of Change and document the added value of our partnership approach in 3 different country contexts. The findings from the partnership research will be finalised by the end of June and it is expected the results will feed into the evaluation.

2. Purpose of the Evaluation

Christian Aid and DFID are keen to understand how Christian Aid's livelihoods and partnership approach works in practice and what elements of the frameworks applied need to be revised. Both Christian Aid and DFID are keen to maximise learning from the project and ensure that lessons are learned from other similar projects and vice versa.

Ghana, Burkina Faso and Myanmar have been selected for the evaluation because they have implemented livelihood projects where the components of the framework have been particularly evident. The sample of countries therefore provides different sets of programme conditions to further test and refine Christian Aid's livelihoods framework.

3. Evaluation Questions

The evaluation questions will focus on improving our understanding of both the results achieved so far (how big, deep, inclusive and lasting the change has been), and the mechanisms by which these results have been achieved (how / why).

Key questions include:

- i) To what extent have Christian Aid Country Programmes improved resilience in the target cases through UKAM funding?
- ii) What results have been achieved in terms of and outside of the livelihoods framework?
- iii) What mechanisms and context is required that best support the implementation of a livelihoods project?

¹ During the design of the UKAM proposal, developing baseline data was not a requirement and we agreed with DFID that this would not be undertaken. It is important to flag the absence of baseline data as this could influence the methodological design choices of the M&E consultant

- iv) How does the Thriving, Resilient Livelihoods Framework need to be adapted?
- v) How has the CA partnership approach affected the livelihoods work of the partners?
- vi) How does CA's global Theory of Change on partnership work in practice in the selected livelihoods Programmes?
- vii) What are the strengths and challenges of the livelihoods and partnership approaches adopted by Christian Aid?

4. Theory of Change for Livelihoods and Partnership

To capture learning from our livelihoods work, the evaluation will adopt a two-step process. Firstly, we will unpack and understand each project to be evaluated by identifying important mechanisms, strong design elements and causal pathways that supported the results achieved and enabled well-functioning livelihoods projects in Burkina Faso, Ghana, and Myanmar. The next step in the evaluation process is to hold up the projects we have identified to Christian Aid's Thriving, Resilient Livelihoods Framework not just to see if the framework can be identified in the success of the projects but to see if the framework is a useful and helpful generalisation of the complex processes, thresholds and pathways at livelihood, community, market and national level that emerge from the individual project case studies. The identification of these mechanisms and causal pathways will be fed back into the livelihoods and partnership framework to improve practice. The key elements of Christian Aid's livelihoods framework are provided below:



Partnership is the cornerstone of Christian Aid's programme work. Working with partners is central to delivering CA's programme approach and allows for a two-way exchange of resources, knowledge, and learning that draws on strengths, and supports the limitations, of each party. Partners are the bridge between programme and project: feeding practical experience and the voices of poor women and men into the programme, as well as implementing projects which are the reality of programme action. As a non-operational agency, we cannot and do not want to go it alone in our bid to achieve change. Partnership is at the heart of what we do.

5. Evaluation Approach

Christian Aid subscribes to the BOND NGO Evidence Principles, and would like the evaluator to take these principles into consideration in the evaluation design. In addition, the consultant[s] is encouraged to draw on the OECD-DAC Quality standards for developing evaluations. The evaluation approach will include the following:

Preparation

- Literature review: key documents will be provided by Christian Aid (Item 10 Key Documents). A lot of contextual background has been gathered over the life-cycle of the projects and so the literature review will be vital in pulling everything together. However further data gathering and interviews will be required. Documentation will be provided by CA (country teams and London office) and in-country partners.
- There will be a briefing session with the consultant[s] and the evaluation steering committee to discuss the objectives and scope of work, and agree timelines.

Field work

- Data collection and analysis methodologies will be developed in consultation with country offices and agreed with the consultant[s] through an inception report. Various data sets already exist for the evaluation and it is expected the consultant will draw on the data that is already available. If additional data is required this should be agreed in consultation with the country programmes prior to the field visits.
- Field visits to the focus countries (Burkina Faso, Ghana, Myanmar). Before each visit, a briefing should be held with in-country staff who will communicate the needs of the project visits to partners. After every country field assessment, an in-country debriefing session with partners and CA staff must be conducted, highlighting key issues, and addressing any clarifications before proceeding for field work in the next country.
- A debrief call will also be held with the Senior Programme Manager, Large and Complex Programmes (LCP), following country visits.

Outputs

The consultant[s] will be responsible for delivering the following outputs:

- i) **Inception report**: This report will provide an overview of the approach to be taken by the evaluation consultants, including: elaboration of the conceptual framework to be applied in answering evaluation questions; definition of sub-questions to support interrogation of key areas of the conceptual framework; use of current data sets; identification of key groups and sampling; definition of data collection tools.
- ii) **Post field work brief**: This will be a short report highlighting emerging issues and thoughts on the evaluation.
- iii) Final full report: This full report details and supports the finding of the evaluation and provides recommendations for adapting Christian Aids livelihoods framework and partnership approach. The report should include: executive summary with separate country summaries; a detailed analysis of findings based on the TOR capturing each section and answering the key questions in each section and emerging issues; separate recommendations per country; annexes with list of all people interviewed, areas visited and dates; annexes with findings from stakeholders, community meetings.
- iv) **3 page policy brief:** The policy brief should clearly outlines the context of the evaluation, set out the findings. The paper should outline what actions could be taken to address the issues identified during the evaluation and the potential implications of these actions (or inactions).

Local consultant

The successful lead consultant will be expected to work with a local consultant in each of the target countries. Christian Aid country programmes will be responsible for recruiting local consultants.

The role of the Local Consultants will be defined with the Lead Consultant, in line with their skills, experience and expertise. It is expected that they will: 1) lead the synthesis of available incountry data; and (2) accompany the lead consultant into the field and provide contextual information to feed into each of the outputs listed above.

The lead consultant is responsible for managing the local consultants.

6. Stakeholders and Roles

Line management

The consultant[s] will be managed by the Senior Programme Manager – Programme Development, Large and Complex Programmes Division (LCP), working closely with members of the evaluation steering committee.

Country programmes

The three Christian Aid country programmes (Ghana, Burkina Faso and Myanmar), CA Programme Performance Division, and LCP will work closely with the consultant to finalise the methodology for the evaluation and will also be responsible for all in-country logistical arrangements.

Steering committee

An evaluation steering committee has been established to provide strategic direction and oversight to the evaluation process to ensure that it meets its aims and objectives as set out in the concept note (attached). It is comprised of: CA Large and Complex Programmes Division staff; CA Programme Performance; CA Country Managers (Burkina Faso, Ghana, and Myanmar); DFID Resilience Advisor; DFID Evaluation Advisor.

Reference group

In addition a reference group, comprising representatives from implementing partners, will provide the steering committee with ongoing and practical advice on the roll out and implementation of the evaluation. The reference group will operate virtually and all input will by email and/or skype.

Partners

The seven partners responsible for project implementation in the three target countries will be key to the evaluation as they have an in depth understanding of the projects and will help to facilitate access to local communities and any information the consultants will need.

- CA expects to manage international travel arrangements, however please provide an indicative travel plan and costs.

- Demonstrable experience of designing and conducting quality evaluations of large programmes
- Familiarity with current debates and approaches to livelihoods work within the international arena
- Experience evaluating projects/programmes supporting livelihoods preferred
- Extensive experience of combining quantitative and qualitative / participatory approaches to evaluation and analysing findings
- Proven conceptual, analytical, research and writing skills
- Fluency in written and spoken English is required

Preferable

- Familiarity with the socio-political context of Burkina Faso, Ghana, and Myanmar
- Fluency in written and spoken French
- Experience with Civil Society programmes.

ETHICAL STANDARDS

We look to work in partnership with suppliers to ensure that:

- 1) Waste is minimised and items recycled whenever this is practicable. Effective controls of waste in respect of ground, air and water pollution are adopted. In the case of hazardous materials emergency response plans are in place.
